WAYS TO PAY

- Online Banking:
 - Search for "Kelowna" as the payee
 - Folio number = account number
 - You may need to add zeros in front of your folio number if shorter than the entry field
- At City Hall:
 Drop box at front entrance

- Mail: Post-dated cheques are accepted

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused a disruption in income for many taxpayers. To support residents facing economic hardships, the penalty date has been extended. Any property taxes unpaid after August 31 will be charged a 10 per cent penalty for late payment. Please pay your property taxes by July 2 to help maintain the City's ability to provide essential services.

TAX BILL SAVINGS: APPLY TODAY

Provincial programs can help you save on your tax bill. Check if you are eligible and apply before **July 2**.

- Home Owner Grant: helps to reduce the amount of your property taxes. You must apply for the grant each year. If you are eliqible, save time by applying online.
- Tax deferment: a low-interest provincial loan option to pay the current year's property taxes on your principal residence.
 Apply online at www.gov.bc.ca/propertytaxdeferment.

Are you a registered non-profit organization? The City of Kelowna offers permissive tax exemptions to qualifying organizations.

Apply online before July 15 for a 2021 exemption.

Your tax bill includes amounts for other taxing authorities:

Taxes are calculated on your property's assessed value, determined by BC Assessment in January every year.

or 2020, Council has approved a 2.05 per cent taxation demand increase. This means that the owner of a single-family detached home with an average \$676,100 assessed value will pay \$2,115 in City of Kelowna taxes this year. This works out to an increase of \$3.54 per month, or \$0.82 per week for an average home's bill.

Taxation demand amounts are based on what the City needs to balance the budget. Taxation for the City of Kelowna accounts for 25 per cent of the City's total revenue budget needed to deliver services to residents.

Manage your City accounts online

Register for a City Property Account today!

Registering for a City Property Account (formerly named Online Billing) allows you to manage your City accounts (property tax & utility billing) in one easy and accessible location, including if you manage multiple properties. Once registered, you can view your assessment, balance and financial transaction information and historical bills online. You can also opt-in to go paperless for your 2021 tax notice.

To register, you need your folio number and access code provided on your property tax notice. Register today at billing.kelowna.ca.

WHAT DO YOUR TAX DOLLARS PAY FOR?

Each property tax bill helps pay for key City initiatives that make Kelowna a great place to live. City of Kelowna property taxes fund \$148.8 million of the total \$595.9 million in City expenses in 2020. Based on an average home bill, monthly amounts of your tax bill pay for:

PUBLIC SAFETY: Police & fire

45% ≈ \$79.92

TRANSPORTATION & MOBILITY: Transportation & public transit

19% **≈** \$32.43

VIBRANT NEIGHBOURHOODS: Parks, active living & culture

18% ≈ \$31.92

The remaining 18% (\$31.95) of the average monthly tax bill covers buildings, utilities, planning and development, debt, grants and regional programs.

Maintaining essential services and planning for economic recovery

veryone in our community is having to adapt and make some tough financial decisions – including the City. Through this time, we will maintain a balanced budget by freezing non-essential spending, delaying the start of some new projects, reducing operational budgets, freezing the hiring of many currently vacant positions, and suspending procurement of goods and services that are not absolutely critical. Cash balances will be supported through investment draws, reserve allocations and potentially borrowing, if required.

Investing in community safety

We're working to ensure that Kelowna continues to be a safe place to live, work and do business. Earlier this year, we launched a CCTV Registry pilot program in partnership with the Kelowna RCMP and Downtown Kelowna Association (DKA). This voluntary registry records the location of business security cameras within the boundaries of the DKA providing RCMP with quicker access to potential sources of video evidence.

We continue to support the RCMP and agencies that lead the Kelowna Outreach and Support Table (KOaST) which helps individuals who are at a critical risk point through coordinated interventions with support services to reduce the level of risk. To date, 77 individual and family situations have been addressed, with the majority connected to services.

In July 2019, we hired a Director of Community Safety to provide sustained leadership in collaborating with partners and the community to address the social impact of the opioid crisis and homelessness among other responsibilities related to enforcement and safety.



Planning for the future to 2040

KELOWNA 2040: OUR KELOWNA AS WE GROW

Envisioning what Kelowna will look like in 2040 requires creating a comprehensive 20-year growth strategy to set the city on a path to its desired long-term vision and help us build a great city. A draft of the Official Community Plan (OCP) is still expected to be completed this fall 2020, followed by a proposed final round of public engagement before the end of the year. A final version will be presented for Council's consideration in early 2021. Learn more at kelowna.ca/kelowna2040.

KELOWNA 2040: OUR KELOWNA AS WE MOVE

A good transportation network is one that is safe, cost-effective and sustainable – all elements that are being explored in Kelowna's Transportation Master Plan (TMP), expected to be completed by the end of 2020. The planning process has included several rounds of public engagement, analysis of roadways, bike lanes, pathways and transit networks, as well as looking at future travel conditions and changing technologies. Staff are now monitoring the impacts of COVID-19 and will incorporate considerations into long range planning documents as appropriate. The final phase of public engagement to seek input on the draft TMP is proposed in late summer 2020. Learn more at kelowna.ca/transportation2040.



GET INVOLVED & STAY INFORMED

We are committed to continuing to engage with the public and stakeholders on City projects, initiatives and programs. As a result of COVID-19 and physical distancing measures, we are exploring new digital technologies for meaningful public engagement and are evaluating our traditional engagement methods. Addressing homelessness and housing affordability

The City of Kelowna continues to support and work with the Journey Home Society to foster an inclusive community and improve the quality of life for people experiencing homelessness.

Atop action for the Society is to see the addition of 300 long-term supportive housing units in purpose-built buildings to help people experiencing chronic and episodic homelessness in Kelowna. Since June 2018, 136 apartment units have been created, with another 100 expected for 2020/2021.

In January 2020, the City proudly announced its partnership with BC Housing and community organizations to bring more than 250 new affordable rental homes to Kelowna. These include 61 affordable rental homes for low-to middle-income individuals and families and 186 new rental homes for people with middle incomes.

Clean drinking water

elowna Integrated Water Phase 1 is an \$86-million, multi-year project and will separate agricultural and domestic water systems in Southeast Kelowna and deliver a sustainable water supply to agriculture in the South Mission.

The project will bring clean drinking water to about 2,000 households and meet Interior Health's 2025 clean drinking water mandate almost 10 years earlier than planned in Southeast Kelowna. Expected to be complete by 2021, this is the first phase of the City's vision to see a city-wide integrated water system through the 2017 Kelowna Integrated Water Supply plan.

DID YOU KNOW?

In 2019, the Glenmore Landfill serviced a population of 217,214, who brought in 156,566 tonnes of waste to the landfill, of which 33.8% was diverted/recycled?

he Glenmore Landfill is open seven days a week from 7:30 a.m. - 4:45 p.m. and offers a variety of disposal options on site including recycling, organic materials, household and commercial waste. During the COVID-19 pandemic the Landfill is only accepting non-cash payments for streamlining and health safety purposes.

Emergency preparation

The best time to prepare for an emergency is before there is one. Visit cordemergency.ca for helpful information to help you and your family know the risks, get a kit and make a plan. Sign-up for e-updates to have the latest emergency notifications delivered to your inbox.

As we head into the summer season and experience drier conditions, a reminder that all open flame burning within Kelowna City limits is not permitted. This means campfires and wood-fueled fire pits are not allowed both in public spaces and on private property. Barbecues should be fueled by propane, gas or charcoal.
